Business as usual has been failing working families

• Early childhood education is an essential public good that enables all children to reach

their full potential, advancing equity in DC

 Child care enables parents to work and contribute the economy

 Safe and affordable child care are more important than ever as the District rebuilds

Good, living wages for early childhood educators
are necessary for creating a caring economy that works for working families





Building back better with a caring economy!

- Birth-to-Three law improves quality, availability, and affordability of child care
- Change must be phased in in the right ways to create lasting, system-wide change
- Strengthening the subsidy program is essential for expanding access to high-quality care while preventing displacement of smaller child care options






COVID-19 Impact on District Budget

- DC experienced a \$471.5 million loss in second half of FY 2020 (April Sept 2020)
- DC is expected to lose an additional \$2.9 <u>billion</u> between FY 2021 and FY 2024
- Belt-tightening and program cuts do more harm to Black, brown, and low-income residents, and our economy. Cuts to essential programs are unacceptable, and preventable.
- Revenue increases should be part of the conversation, including asking more from those with the greatest ability to give.

Revenue Projections, in Billions, by Forecast and Fiscal Year



DC Taxes Are Not Very Progressive, Top 80% All Pay About the Same Share






Budget Policy is Racial Justice

We believe budgeting for a just recovery should:


- 1. Put People First
